

Let a Woman Learn

## Introduction

In this passage we learn biblical principles for thinking about men and women in the church.

## The Text: 1 Timothy 2:11-15

<sup>11</sup> Let a woman learn quietly with all submissiveness. <sup>12</sup> I do not permit a woman to teach or to exercise authority over a man; rather, she is to remain quiet. <sup>13</sup> For Adam was formed first, then Eve; <sup>14</sup> and Adam was not deceived, but the woman was deceived and became a transgressor. <sup>15</sup> Yet she will be saved through childbearing—if they continue in faith and love and holiness, with self-control.

1) The foreignness of this passage in our contemporary age is explained in three ways.

This text is (1) cultural ... (2) situational ... (3) foundational?

- 2) God's design for male and female reflects the ministry of Jesus to all people (v. 11).
- 3) God's design for male and female reflects the authority of Jesus over all people (v. 12).
  (a) *Teaching*: There is a divinely established division of labor in the church regarding God's Word.
  - (b) <u>Spiritual Oversight</u>: In God's design, the office of pastor-elder is reserved for qualified men alone.

## Three reasons that, we can be sure, ARE NOT BEHIND God's design for the church:

- (1) Value Reason: Men are more important and of greater worth to God than women.
- (2) Preference Reason: God prefers and favors men more than women.
- (3) Performance Reason: Men are smarter, better leaders, and more competent than women.

## Three reasons THAT MIGHT EXPLAIN what is behind God's design for the church:

- (1) Gospel Reason: it reflects and points to Christ, head of the church, husband of Christ's bride (Eph 5).
- (2) Practical Reason: it provides an organizational structure for ministry and relationships (1 Cor 11)
- (3) Big-Picture Reason: it is ultimately for God's glory and for our good (Rom 8:28).
- 4) God's design for male and female is rooted in the order and structure of creation (vv. 13-14).
- 5) God's design for male and female exalts women and their significance in the purposes of God (v. 15).

Gen 3:16 – <sup>16</sup> To the woman [God] said, "I will surely multiply your <u>pain in childbearing</u>; <u>in pain you shall bring</u> <u>forth children</u>. Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you."

**Response:** Again, hear this truth: God made you man and woman for his glory and our mutual good.

Sunday Text Questions for 1 Timothy 2:11-15, Part 2 ("Entrusted to You" Series) February 21, 2021 Pastor Mickey Klink

- 1) Starter Question: If you are being honest, which word best describes your reaction to this passage: uncomfortable, discouraging, or encouraging?
- 2) Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.
- 3) Since v. 11 is talking to the pastors and the congregation, what is the significance of the command, "Let a woman learn," especially in an ancient context where women were not educated?
- 4) Why does "with all submissiveness" in v. 11, at least to modern readers, sound like a demotion or rebuke, rather than a statement about order and structure during church gatherings?
- 5) How does v. 12 offer the clearest statement in all of Scripture that the church office of pastor-elder is reserved for men (only "qualified" men see Ch. 3)?
- 6) What is your gut-level response to v. 12? What response does God expect to v. 12?
- 7) How do vv. 13-14 explain that the specific design for men and women is rooted in creation, and why is that important?
- 8) How is v. 15 alluding to Genesis 3:16, and what is Paul actually saying when he uses the phrase, "saved through childbearing?"
- 9) What does Paul mean when he exhorts women to live out their Christian life "in faith and love and holiness, with self-control?"
- 10) How might this passage be viewed negatively by women, how might it be viewed positively, and which perspective is more accurate (biblical)?
