Introduction

In this sermon we learn biblical practices and applications for men and women in the church.

The Text: 1 Timothy 2:11-15

¹¹ Let a woman learn quietly with all submissiveness. ¹² I do not permit a woman to teach or to exercise authority over a man; rather, she is to remain quiet. ¹³ For Adam was formed first, then Eve; ¹⁴ and Adam was not deceived, but the woman was deceived and became a transgressor. ¹⁵ Yet she will be saved through childbearing—if they continue in faith and love and holiness, with self-control.

1) We need to begin with a brief review of our previous two sermons on 1 Timothy 2:11-15.

- 2) What 1 Timothy 2:11-15 *is not* saying.
 - a) It is not speaking in a misogynistic way or thinking from the perspective of the "modern self."

b) It is not addressing the roles of women outside the church – in the home or society.

- c) It is not limiting women in any role or service in the church except one: the office of pastor-elder.
- 3) What 1 Timothy 2:11-15 is saying.
 - a) It commands the church to allow women to be full recipients and participants in the church.
 - b) It commands the church to make gender a qualification for the office of pastor-elder and its duties.
 - c) It reminds the church that what God called "very good" at creation has permanence and authority.
 - d) It warns men and women not to break the created order, especially for spiritual reasons.

e) It elevates the purposeful design of women and exhorts them to discover the joy and fruitfulness that awaits them.

Response

Never forget this core biblical truth: God made you man and woman for his glory and our mutual good.

- 1) Starter Question: What has been your response to our three-week discussion of this passage?
- 2) What have you learned from this passage that has been helpful for you?
- 3) Regarding what has been helpful, how did this text change the way you think or act?
- 4) What has been difficult for you about this passage (be honest)?
- 5) Regarding what has been difficult, was the difficulty an issue of interpretation or application, and in what way?
- 6) How should a Bible-based church use this passage authoritatively in its corporate life and ministry?
- 7) How would you explain this passage outside the church to non-Christians?
- 8) How can the church our church do better at making women full recipients and participants in the church?
- 9) How can we make sure we are obeying the permanence and authority of God's purposeful design established at creation?
- 10) What are one or two applications for you, your marriage, or your participation in Hope Church that you have received from this passage?
