

Easter is Universal and Personal

Introduction

In this sermon we explore how Easter celebrates the life and ministry of Jesus and "the gospel."

The Text: Romans 8:18-25

¹⁸ For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. ¹⁹ For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. ²⁰ For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope ²¹ that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to corruption and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. ²² For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. ²³ And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. ²⁴ For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? ²⁵ But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

- 1) Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ and therefore the turning-point of God's saving activity in the world.
 - (1) **Incarnation** In Jesus, God comes to a sinful and needy world (**Separation**).
 - (2) **Perfect Life** Jesus lived the obedient life we failed to live before God (Sin).
 - (3) Sacrificial Death Jesus died the atoning death that paid the penalty for our sins (Salvation).
 - (4) **Resurrection** Jesus defeats the effects of sin and death and initiates the new creation (Surety).
 - (5) Ascension Jesus now reigns, ministers by his Spirit, and will perfect all things (Supremacy).
- 2) The Gospel is both Universal and Personal (Romans 8:18-25).

The Gospel is **Universal** (vv. 18-22)



With purpose God has created his world. In love God is redeeming his world. With supremacy God will perfect his world. The Gospel is **Personal** (vv. 23-25)



With purpose God has created every person. In love God is redeeming his people. With supremacy God will perfect his people.

Response

On Easter Sunday, Christians celebrate the truth of the Gospel – the universal and personal work of Jesus.

Sunday Text Questions for Easter Romans 8:18-25

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1)	Starter Question: What is the basis for a Christian's "hope?"
2)	Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.
3)	How can Paul say in v. 18 that our present sufferings "are not worth comparing" to the glory that is to be revealed?
4)	Why does Paul describe the sufferings of the physical creation in vv. 19-22, and how is creation "subjected to futility" and in "bondage?"
5)	Why might it be significant that Paul does not merely speak of the future redemption of God's people but also the future redemption of God's creation?
6)	What does it mean to "have the first fruits of the Spirit" (v. 23), and how does this give the Christian a foundation and hope in the midst of suffering?
7)	What should the phrase, "the redemption of our bodies" (v. 23), teach us about the physical reality of the new creation?
8)	How might this passage help Christians make room in their lives for the practice of lament?
9)	How does the celebration of Easter and the resurrection of Jesus guarantee that our present sufferings will one day be changed to incomparable glory?
10)	What is a present suffering in your life right now that needs to be infused with the hope discussed in this passage?
