

# Surprised by Joy

8<sup>th</sup> in the "Psalms" Series Psalm 8 December 11, 2022 Pastor Kurt Pazdra

#### Introduction

In this sermon, we learn how to let Psalm 8 lead us in joyful praise—no matter the darkness we face or feel.

### The Text: Psalm 8

To the choirmaster: according to The Gittith. A Psalm of David.

- <sup>1</sup> O LORD our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens.
- Out of the mouth of babies and infants,, you have established strength because of your foes, To still the enemy and avenger.
- <sup>3</sup> When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers the moon and the stars, which you have set in place,
- which you have set in place,

  what is man that you are mindful of him,
  and the son of man that you care for him?

- <sup>5</sup> You have made him a little lower than the heavenly beings [or, *than God*] and crowned him with glory and honor.
- <sup>6</sup> You have given him dominion over the works of your hands;
  - you have put all things under his feet,
- <sup>7</sup> all sheep and oxen,
  - and also the beasts of the field,
- <sup>8</sup> the birds of the heavens, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas.
- <sup>9</sup>O LORD our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!

<u>Message</u>: Simply being human is an exciting reason to praise God with joy, especially when we look at all King Jesus has done for us. Jesus defeated our enemies and leads a truly human life for us to follow into God's glory.

Q: How do we let a Psalm like Psalm 8 lead us in joyful praise to God—no matter the darkness we face or feel?

A: We read with our hearts, heads, and then our hearts again:

- 1. Let our hearts **follow** where the Psalm **leads** us. (Proclaim God's glory by praising his Name!) [v.1]
- 2. Let our heads **ponder** what the Psalm **shows** us. (All creation praises God and we must join!) [vv. 1, 3, 7-9]
- 3. Let our hearts **delight** when the Psalm **jolts** us. (Here I'm giving God glory... God gave me glory?!) [4-6]
- 4. Let us **receive** King Jesus in the Psalm. (Jesus came to defeat our enemies and fulfill our destiny!) [2]
- 5. **Respond** with *joyful praise* to the LORD, no matter what darkness we face or feel. [9]

# **Application**

With thankful hearts, let's praise God with joy as we approach the Lord's Supper and Advent.

# **Sunday Text Questions**

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1)	Starter Question: Describe the feeling of losing joy. What are the reasons why people may find joy hard to feel during Advent/Christmas?
2)	Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.
3)	The Psalms are written to lead us in praising God with the right emotion and doctrine – our hearts and heads in unison. Why should we read the Psalms with our hearts, our heads, and then our hearts again?
4)	How does the start of this Psalm (vv.1-2) invite our hearts into thanksgiving, praise, and joy?
5)	How does the structure of this Psalm guide the way we praise God (especially vv.1-3, 7-9)?
6)	Read vv. 4-6. Is there anything shocking about these verses? If so, what?
7)	How do you respond when God's Word declares that God crowned humanity with glory and honor? What do you feel when you hear this?
8)	Read Daniel 7:13-14, 27, which is a vision about Jesus receiving his dominion, glory, and a kingdom. Compare what you find in these verses with Psalm 8:4-7. What is similar, and why?
9)	How do you feel knowing that King Jesus, who is truly God and truly human, reigns in victory over our sin and death and leads us in living a truly human life that gives God glory as we reign with him?
10)	) What can you do with what you've learned to spread the joy of King Jesus this Christmas?
