Introduction

In this passage God teaches us about the unique relationship between Christians and the love faith demands.		
Γhe Text: Philemon 4-7		
1) The force behind Paul's appeal to Philemon is the important relationship between love and faith (vv. 4-5).		
2) Faith in Christ leads to love for others directed by the special, shared identity between Christians (v. 6).		
3) God wants Hope Church to deepen and expand our faith-derived love for others (v. 7).		
Response		
The two legs of the Christian walk are love and faith		

- o In the same way that our faith unites us intimately to Christ, so also it unites us to our fellow Christians and directs our love for them.
- o How can a person put this into practice?
 - (1) Commit to God's Son, Jesus (faith)
 - (2) Connect to God's people (church)
 - (3) Contribute to God's work (love)

Sermon Questions for Philemon 4-7

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1)	Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.	
2)	In v. 4 and v. 6 Paul explains his prayers for Philemon. What do those verses reveal about the amount Paul prayers and for what he prays? How should we emulate Paul's prayer practices?	
3)	What is the significance of the qualifier "my God" in v. 4, and how does that teach us to relate to God?	
4)	The Greek text for v. 5 is complex. After comparing different translations (e.g., ESV and NIV) for v. 5, what are the differences between them, and which one better fits the context of vv. 4-7?	
5)	Why might Paul refer to Christians as "saints" (note: the term's origin means "holiness")?	
6)	The word translated as "sharing" (ESV) or "partnership" (NIV) in v. 6 is the Greek word <i>koinonia</i> . The term <i>koinonia</i> refers to special relationship and intimate fellowship that exists between Christians. Based upon the rest of the Bible, how would you explain the unique relationship that exists between Christians?	
7)	What is Paul saying when he prays that the <i>koinonia</i> between Christians "may become effective for the full knowledge of every good thing that is in us" (v. 6)?	
8)	What does the statement with which Paul ends v. 6 mean: "for the sake of Christ?"	
9)	Rooted in v. 7, how have you been benefited by the love of another Christian? How have you benefited another Christian?	
10)	How do vv. 4-7 set up the appeal Paul is about to make to Philemon? How do these verses also exhort Christians today?
