Introduction

In this passage God teaches the believer that the Christian life combines trust and action.

The Text: 1 Peter 5:6-14		
1)	The life of an Elect Exile is characterized by humility toward God in the midst of suffering (vv. 6-7).	
2)	The life of an Elect Exile is marked by an understanding of the reality of Satan and a resistance to him (vv 8-9).	
3)	The life of an Elect Exile is characterized by a hope and trust in God (vv. 10-11).	
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Response

• As an Elect Exile, you are called to trust in God and put that trust into action every day and in all circumstances.

Sunday Text Questions for 1 Peter 5:6-14

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1)	Starter Question: Why is it so hard to trust in God during difficult times?
2)	Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.
3)	What does it look like for a Christian to "humble themselves under the mighty hand of God" (v. 6)?
4)	What does the end of v. 6 mean: humble yourself so that "at the proper time he [God] may exalt you?"
5)	How does the Christian cast all their anxieties on God (v. 7)?
6)	V. 7 makes a factual claim: God cares for you. How have you seen God's care in your life?
7)	Why might it be important to take seriously the depiction and intentions of the devil given in v. 8?
8)	How does a Christian "resist" the devil, and how might standing firm in the faith be the answer (v. 9)
9)	Is the end of v. 9 saying something like "misery loves company?" How might the truth that the worldwide church is in this battle with you give a unity of strength?
10)	In vv. 10-11 Peter declares that God will restore all things and make all things right by his power and glory. How is this a real hope that can give confidence in the present?
