Definitions

- **Deism** The view that God created the universe but is not now directly involved in the creation.
- Unitarianism A form of Christianity that denies the doctrine of the Trinity.
- Universalism The doctrine that all people will ultimately be saved.
- **Millennialism** The belief, expressed in the Book of Revelation, that Christ will establish a 1000-year reign of the saints on earth (the millennium) before the Last Judgment.
